Daycare Supports Gender Equality at Home*

Abstract

In this study, we assess the impact of daycare enrollment on how childcare and household tasks are shared between mothers and fathers. Utilizing survey data from a Japanese municipality and observing all key variables influencing daycare enrollment, we employ a quasi-experimental approach to infer causal relationships. Our findings reveal that daycare enrollment leads to greater involvement by fathers in housework and childcare, concurrently with a reduction in mothers' participation in these areas. Notably, the shift in household labor dynamics appears to stem primarily from a direct influence of daycare enrollment on fathers' behavior, rather than from an increase in maternal employment.
